

Ordinance No. 123.

Are Ordinance to prevent the spread of contagious diseases,
in the City of Albany.

Ord No. 123
Rep 1506

Enacted by the Common Council of the City
of Albany.

Sec 1. That from all buildings in which there are persons
infected with Scarlet Fever, Small Pox, Measles or Diphtheria, there
shall be kept suspended by the occupants thereof, a colored
flag, from the side of the building fronting the street, to
indicate the existence of such disease.

Sec 2. Said flags shall be not less than (10) ten by (12)
twelve inches, and shall be red in case of Scarlet fever, and
diphtheria; yellow for small pox, and blue for measles.

Sec 3. That the Marshal of said City as soon as he is
informed of the existence of such disease shall cause
such flag to be placed as aforesaid, and such flag
shall remain there, until such person, or persons having
such disease shall have so far recovered, that no danger
by infection shall remain; and any person neglecting, or
refusing or failing to place such flag when notified by the
Marshal shall on conviction before the Recorder be fined in
a sum of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars.
Sec 4. This Ordinance to be in force from and after five
days after publication.
