

ORDINANCE No. 1350

An ordinance appropriating the sum of \$500.00 of the Emergency Fund for the purpose of caring for and administering relief to paupers within the city of Albany suffering for want of food and other necessities of life, providing for the disbursement thereof and declaring an emergency.

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ALBANY DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the general funds of the City of Albany, Oregon, the sum of \$500.00 chargeable against the emergency fund of said City, for the purpose of administering relief to paupers within the City of Albany suffering for want of food and other necessities of life.

Section 2. The fund hereby appropriated shall be expended under the supervision of the health and police committee of the City Council and all bills incurred thereby shall be presented to, audited by and paid by, the Council in the same manner as other bills against the City, and said expenditures shall be charged to the emergency fund of said City.

Section 3. Whereas, the peace, health and safety of the people of ^{the City of} Albany require that this ordinance become immediately effective, therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall become immediately in full force and effect upon the final passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.


